Two of our students passed the US Citizenship Test and one more student enrolled in our GED program bringing the total GED students to five. Furthermore, five students gained first-time employment, a book was dedicated to Literacy Partners, we had our first successful fundraiser, and many students accomplished short and long-term goals. With financial help from the Greater Green Bay Community Foundation, several local businesses and some board members and tutors digging deep in their own pockets, we were able to hire a part-time coordinator, Anne Laurent. Our wonderful tutors continue to help people help themselves and in turn provide better lives for their families. Unselfish tutors and board members complied almost 5,000 volunteer hours in 2010 which equates to a donation of service to Kewaunee County residents of about \$89,000 (volunteer time in Wisconsin is calculated at \$17.70/hr).

There is no reason not to be optimistic about 2011. Three students are studying for the citizenship test and we may have our first GED graduate! Anne is working on three possible fundraisers and we will soon be sending information to tutors about our new Health Literacy Program. I look forward to an exciting 2011 and all of the challenges it will bring.

Does it seem reasonable to use a child's hammer to drive a large spike into a board? Does it make sense to teach a child or adult by lecturing when they work best visually or by manipulating objects?

Finding the right presenters for a learning styles workshop was not easy. The committee turned over a lot of stones looking for the right people. We have spared no expense for this presentation, looking for two presenters well known throughout the state of Wisconsin, only to find them in our own backyard. The leaders of the learning styles workshop will be our very own Mary Novak and Bob Garfinkel!

Mary, the Kewaunee County Extension Family Living Educator, has a BS in home economics, MS in curriculum instruction, is an advisor for our board of directors, and is a certified tutor. Mary has worked with people of all ages and abilities and is well aware of learners' individual differences.

Bob is a former elementary school teacher, and also has a MS degree. He taught at LC for 13 years, specializing in individualized education, and set up the school's first gifted and talented program. Bob taught fishing for 22 years and capitalized on using student's learning styles to teach fly tying and various outdoor skills.

This workshop will provide information concerning the different learning styles, how to address each learning style as far as your instruction is concerned, and, as an active participant in this workshop, you will take a learning style inventory and learn how to interpret the results.

The Trainer's Corner

Everyone in our program with computer access has at their fingertips printable worksheets available through our program's membership in the Great Start 5 Training Program® (thanks to our membership in Wisconsin Literacy). Our program tutors need only to contact me and I will provide the information needed to get started. (920-255-3345) Module 10, pages 17—46 you might find the most helpful. Topics: Cursive Writing, Common Words Sight List, Consonant Blends/Digraphs and Spelling Tips and Rules. I'm going to explore with you how to begin to introduce spelling using the "Vowels-Pattern" worksheet on page 42 and the word family lists, pages 30-38.

One of the shortfalls of our core curriculum is that it doesn't introduce students to spelling soon enough. To compensate for this, I use the "Vowel-Pattern" worksheet. I start using this as soon as the student completes Level I, Lesson 3—all the consonants, except q, x, and z, have been introduced. The student builds word families based on the key words and sight vocabulary that has been introduced. By lesson 3, the student has been

introduced to the following words: cup, dish, and, an, jump, kick, neck, snake, leg, tent, and yell. From this list the student begins to build word families. I allow proper names, but not nonsense words. The goal is to connect letters with sounds to help the students see relationships. I dictate the words the student writes, starting with the familiar word. This is not a vocabulary exercise. Some students use an online dictionary to check for meaning, but that is up to them. (Some students would find the added vocabulary overwhelming—others run with it.) At the end of each lesson, the word lists are revisited. New words are added to the families and new families introduced. Do not start adding consonant blends until the student has an example of that sound. For instance, in lesson 5, the words "shop" and "thank" are introduced. Now you may introduce the "sh" and "th" blend.

Pages 30—38 provide quick reference to word families and would allow you to check off each word as it is introduced.
