On May 1, 2014, Shawn Jensen, NWTC Instructor extraordinaire, hit the ball out of the park with her presentation! About 20 tutors, one-third of our tutor numbers, were upbeat and excited after the presentation. In fact, their evaluation (on paper) was the highest rated workshop we've ever had! Shawn summarized a study made by Lynn Mullens, NWTC Green Bay, concerning English Language Learner articles about the teaching of pronunciation (mostly Hispanics).

- *Students want to learn to pronounce all sounds of English, not only the ones which they make mistakes.
- *Students want to learn pronunciation in a classroom environment-not alone (includes 1 on 1 tutoring).
- *Students prefer to learn pronunciation using a computer only if an instructor is present.
- *Students are comfortable having others hear their mistakes
- *Students like to learn pronunciation from instructors who use a variety of books, activities, games, and practice sheets.
