


Tutor Survey 2017 Results

As a tutor, what type of in-service program would you like to have in 2017?




What could our Board of Directors do to help you be more effective in working with your student?



If you use the Ventures text, how satisfied are you with the Ventures program so far?




How can Literacy Partners attract more tutors?



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More than three decades after publication of her first book, Irish Thoroughbred, Nora continues to hone her craft, working on one book at a time. Nora Roberts first appeared on the New York Times Best Seller list in 1991, nearly a decade after that first book, and every book since 1999 has appeared on that list.

For Nora Roberts, a life-long love of reading and telling stories is accompanied by a long history of philanthropy. She personally donated to organizations such as ProLiteracy, MPT, United Way, and the Alzheimer's Association for manv vears. In



1994, Nora created a college scholarship competition for seniors at Boonsboro High School (her sons' alma mater) who planned to study some form of writing in college. Each spring for the past 23 years, Nora reads every entry and judges the winner of the scholarship. Recently, Hannah Gerson, one of the earliest winners, joined Nora at a book signing at Turn the Page Bookstore to celebrate and autograph her own debut novel.

The seeds of the Nora Roberts Foundation are rooted in the Boonsboro High School scholarship and her history of personal philanthropy. As the Foundation's framework took shape, Nora and her family focused on Literacy, Children's programs, Arts organizations and Humanitarian efforts. Through many grants over the last 17 vears, The Nora RobertsFoundation contributes to literacy and access to literature for all, the protection and appreciation of nature and art, and the education and well-being of children and adults.

When to Call 911?

I bet your student is familiar with the numbers 911. But, does he or she know when it is appropriate to use them? Your student may think 911 should be used for any situation requiring help such as minor health issues, bursting water pipes, their cat ran away, etc. Other students may not call 911 because they fear their English is not good enough to communicate a proper message. Dispatchers will claim that 10% or more of their 911 calls are not emergencies.

I have used the following scenarios in conversations about health, working on telephone skills and role playing. Give it a try!

- Ask the student if he/she knows what 911 is. Be sure the student understands it is a number to call when there is a medical or home emergency.
- 2. Ask if the student knows when to call 911?
- Activity-Use 2 pieces of paper with 1 marked "OK to call 911" and the other "Not okay to call 911" on it. Have strips of paper with different situations on each. Read each one to the student or if the student can read alone, all the better. Simply have the student place the situation under the proper heading:

OK to call 911	NOT okay to call 911
Medical Emergency	When the power goes out
House Fire	When water pipes break or
Heart Attack/Chest pain	leak
Domestic Violence	For a ride to the doctor's
Car accident	office
Choking family member	For your pet
or friend	As a joke
Someone is breaking into	For a plugged toilet
your house	Your roof is leaking
	A squirrel got in your car
	To get directions

What really is effective is to role play many different situations. Use cell phones or pretend to use phones and stage 911 calls. Discuss the conversation first. You be the 911 operator and the student is the caller. Roles may be reversed. Not only is this an important skill for the student to master, but communication skills are improved along the way!

Sample 911 Conversation:

911 OPERATOR: 911, what is the nature of your emergency?

CALLER: Help me. My house is burning!

911 OPERATOR: Where are you right now? **CALLER:** Outside my house.

911 OPERATOR: What is your address?

CALLER: Caller gives their address—some do not know—good opportunity to learn!)

911 OPERATOR: I have called the fire department. They will be there soon. Please stay on the line with me until they come.

CALLER: ok.

Of This and That

Handwashing was covered by our Public Health representative Brittney Benzshawl, Milk and Dairy education was handled by Stacy Jauquet on behalf of the Kewaunee County Dairy Promotion, Family Meal time/Eating Together was covered by Laura Apfelbeck, a UW Extension guest, and Calories/energy expenditure were covered by Cythina Farrell, another KC Public Health nurse.

To break up the educational pieces of this event, all participants had some hands on experience making quick and easy healthy breakfasts. Yogurt parfaits (greek yogurt, granola and fruit), as well as whole grain waffles with peanut butter were passed out and assembled by participants. The Kewaunee County Dairy Promotion donated milk for everyone to enjoy, and Imelda Delchambre had a wonderful group of women prepare authentic Honduras, Mexican and Salvadorian breakfasts for everyone in attendance to taste.

The event was a great testament to all the hard work our Health Literacy Committee puts in over the year. The program was educational, fun, and kept kids and families engaged—having participants come forward for demonstrations quite frequently.
