## Lary Swoboda (1939-2012)

Tutor, Legislator, Teacher, Friend

Kewaunee County lost a good friend this past December. Lary Swoboda was a living legend. I used to tease him that he was the man who made Luxemburg famous! I don't know how many times through my travels around Wisconsin I'd meet state legislators, county officials, or people while fishing who would ask where I was from. I'd say, "Luxemburg", and they'd reply, "Oh, the home of Lary Swoboda!"

Lary was our 1<sup>st</sup> District State Assemblyman for 24 years. He was from the old school—let's meet and talk about it. He took the time to meet with constituents at local coffee spots on certain days of the month and talk politics. Sometimes he even bought the coffee! He could have a completely opposing view than you had, but never raised his voice, listened intently, and left the discussion as friends. Compare this to what is going on now! He had the respect from both sides of the aisle.

Lary was a dedicated tutor with Literacy Partners. He tutored through illness the past couple years and

had my respect and that of his student. Jan, his wife and partner in politics and other endeavors, presented me with a generous donation in memorial of Lary, earmarked for our new textbooks.

I worked with Lary on the last effort to start a public library in Luxemburg. We did not succeed (I didn't say failed). What resulted from that effort was Lary and some friends installed his vast library on the stage at the Luxemburg Village Hall for everyone to enjoy.

Lary's love of reading made him the perfect candidate for a position on the Kewaunee County Library Board. His presence on the board was felt from the beginning and was a special voice for the people in Kewaunee County. I served with Lary on the Library Board for 5 or 6 years. Our latest fight was to rectify the \$68,000 library usage bill we received from Brown County for withdrawal of their library materials. The fight will go on, unfortunately without Lary.

Lary was also a school teacher and principal. His thirst for learning was unquenchable! Lary taught me a lot about education and life. He was a person I looked up to and was an important role model for me.

Lary was honored at his funeral by the presence of people from all walks of life. It was the largest tribute to a person I had ever attended. Lary Swoboda was truly a "Man of the People".

## New Textbooks

Our textbook committee met in early spring of 2012 and studied 8 texts for possible adoption. After the committee narrowed the selection to the top two series, four tutors piloted each series with their students for more than 7 months. The committee, along with the pilot tutors, will meet later in January and decide on a single text for our program.



Of particular interest, after extensive discussion, our committee made an important decision. While all 8 of the new series had modern up-to-date stories, they were definitely very limited in phonics instruction. All members agreed that Laubach was more user friendly for speakers of other languages and had much more phonics instruction than the new series. The procedure we'll follow is new students will be evaluated as in the past. Students that score level 3 and above will start in the new series (and take a placement test). Others will start Laubach 1 or 2. After a student completes Level 2 Laubach, he or she will take the placement test for the new series.

After texts are delivered, we'll have tutor inservices for those whose students qualify for the new texts.

## Student Success

Healthy Ways of Cooking with Darlene

Cooking is a lot of work, but it can be healthy. I like to make extra food to eat at work and for the freezer for eating later. And, in the summertime when it is too hot to cook, frozen dinners are ready to eat. My story is about Tater Tot Casseroles, diabetic cooking, microwave cooking and popcorn. I hope you like it.

My favorite food is the recipe for Tater Tot Casserole. My casserole is very good to eat. Now I'm going to tell you how to make it. You cook the hamburger and drain the grease. Put the hamburger in a cake pan and add in mixed vegetables. Put the Tater Tots on top. Put it in the oven at 325 degrees for a half hour and check it to see if it is done.



You don't have to have diabetes to eat diabetic cooking. Diabetic cooking is a healthy way to eat. Things to stay away from are too many potatoes, white sugar, white rice and white bread. We can eat whole grain breads, brown rice and vegetables like lettuce, cabbage, sauerkraut, squash, onions and many more. Reading labels is important to check for dates, sugar and salt.

Popcorn is the perfect snack for watching tv or watching movie. You can make popcorn balls, caramel popcorn, cheese popcorn or Cracker Jacks. Popcorn can be put on a string so you can put it on your Christmas tree or you can sit by the campfire and eat it. If you drop popcorn on the ground, the birds will eat it.

Microwave cooking can be healthy because you can cook using water or no calorie sprays. What I like about microwave cooking is that food gets done faster than cooking on the stove. You can defrost foods that are frozen quickly. With microwave cooking you can also use fewer dishes and save time and energy. My favorite foods to cook in the microwave are baked potatoes, sweet potatoes, ham, hotdogs, chicken, corn, yellow beans, and soup.

My story was about a casserole, popcorn, microwave cooking and diabetic cooking. Of all the foods I talked about, the Tater Tot Casserole is my favorite. Remember, you don't have to be a diabetic to eat healthy.

If you are not familiar with the LFL program, it is a free book exchange where you take a book out of the library and put one of your own back in its place. It is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. No library card is required. Locations are in Fireman's Park, Luxemburg, near the right door as you enter the Bank of Luxemburg, Luxemburg, in front of CenturyLink, Casco, and on the porch at the Belle Isle Inn, Algoma. Someday, LFLs will be in every part of Kewaunee County!



Two of our libraries were donated as memorials from family members honoring a loved one. At this point, donations will determine location of new libraries. Call Bob for more information about LFL or with any questions.


Several notes recently left in our libraries by LFL users include:

### Question 1

Name the one workshop that would help you be a more effective tutor.

#### **Answers**

- a. **Writing paragraphs and stories**  
COMMENT: I agree. It's been 2-3 years since we had this kind of program. Writing and reading go hand in hand. We do have quite a few books covering writing and grammar in the Resource Center, but can always use more. Check out the "Whats New in the Resource Center" article in this issue of the "Star".
- b. **Workshop on conversation**
- c. **Workshop on different cultures that may affect our lessons**  
COMMENT: We had 3 such workshops in the last 5 years. Perhaps next year.
- d. **Issues involving driver's licenses and immigration**  
COMMENT: There is nothing new to report at this time. The internet has all of the information a person needs.
- e. **Understanding how the adult ESL learner learns**
- f. **Learn about exciting new methods**  
COMMENT: See Sharing Sessions in this survey

### Question 2

What new materials do we need in our Resource Center at Hillcrest?

#### **Answers**

- a. **How to fill out forms, especially healthcare**
- b. **Books on how to write paragraphs, English grammar, or spelling. Bilingual books are nice**  
COMMENT: We have many books on these subjects. Check out our "Writing" section.
- c. **More books and stories about real life, personal friendship and family scenarios, hunting, fishing, camping, etc.**

COMMENT: We'd like to do this, but we lack the space and funding. Please use our wonderful public libraries. The purpose of our Resource Center is to provide specific material for adult instruction that is not found in a public library.

- d. **Maybe a language program for the computers**  
COMMENT: We are looking at software right now. Our 2 computers at the Resource Center should be up and running this winter!
- e. **More bilingual books**  
COMMENT: I agree!
- f. **Reference Materials-World Atlas**  
COMMENT: Please use public libraries.
- g. **More male oriented stories**  
COMMENT: Our Resource Center has over 2 dozen titles (with multiple copies) of such books. They are written at levels between 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> grade reading levels.
- h. **I find we have our greatest success when we work from readily available media. He is well advanced in speaking. Much of our resources do not challenge him.**  
COMMENT: Please spend some time in the Resource Center looking around. If this does not work out, please use the public libraries in Algoma or Kewaunee.

### Question 3

Would you be in favor of having several tutor social events to meet other tutors?

**Answer- 18 YES, 5 NO**

COMMENT: Sounds great! If we have 2 or 3 volunteers to help plan, we can have some fun. Call Bob at 920-676-2061 and volunteer today!

*COMMENT: Anne is updating our web page right now. It should have most of the information you and your student would need.*
- g. **Visit a hospital**
- h. **CPR**

### Question 6

Name one way you think Literacy Partners could attract new tutors within Kewaunee County

#### **Answers**

- a. **Advertise in newspapers**  
*COMMENT: I agree. We average about 1-2 new tutors every two articles.*
- b. **Go to schools, community service organizations and churches for students or others who need service hours**  
*COMMENT: We have not gone to churches, but have attended most organizations with such programs without much success. Our ads for new tutors are in most church bulletins. If they are not in yours, and you would like to submit it for us, please contact Bob.*
- c. **Try getting younger people involved.**  
*COMMENT: We do not accept people under 18 years of age as tutors for safety reasons. Generally, tutors in their 20s and 30s quit after several months due to lack of time (small children at home, etc).*
- d. **Through businesses-connecting with people who are retiring.**  
*COMMENT: We find retirees usually want to take a break for 1-2 years before taking*

*on something new. If interested, they can respond to our local advertising.*

- e. **Advertise, advertise, advertise!**  
*COMMENT: We do with little success. Our training classes average 5-6 new tutors.*
- f. **Address the groups at aging centers**
- g. **I believe “word of mouth” is the best**  
*COMMENT: I agree. Let’s get the word out!*
- h. **Presentations to various groups**  
*COMMENT: I have spoken once or more to almost every group in Kewaunee County and have had Little success attracting tutors (money, yes-which we greatly appreciate...but tutors, no.)*
- i. **Have meetings at the libraries**
- j. **Use church bulletins**  
*COMMENT: I agree. They have been fairly productive for us thus far.*
- k. **Have social events and bring a non-tutor with you**  
*COMMENT: 2 people mentioned this. We need volunteers to be on the committee. Call Bob @ 920-676-2061 today!*


### **Thank You!**
