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

What's New in the Resource Center?

New materials are displayed on a table in the Resource Center through May

In our last tutor survey, tutors had a few concerns about materials we are lacking in our Resource Center. Our Tutor & Student Support Committee met, looked for and found most of the materials. We are still searching for top notch quality math workbooks and software.

REQUEST: Materials to "spice up" Laubach Bks 1 & 2.

SOLUTION: Book for Laubach 1 & 2 containing word finds, fill in the missing letters, crossword puzzles and more for each lesson in Laubach 1 & 2. Students may write in the books and answers are in the back.

REQUEST: My student can't type on the computer. Can you find a program to teach my student how to type?

SOLUTION: We found *Typing Instructor*. It is rated the #1 system for learning how to type. The computer CD is also able to run in Spanish if your student is still at a low level in Laubach. Three copies are available to either use at our Hillcrest Resource Center, or to be checked out and used at home.

REQUEST: You have a ton of high/interest low vocabulary books in the Resource Center. The problem is they are geared towards men. Can you find more easy reading books for both men and women?

SOLUTION: The committee found books for men and women that are easy to read. We ordered 2 copies of each. If they are high in demand, we will order more. Titles Include:

In from the Cold; Reading Level: 4.0, Rose and her daughter Hazel are on the run in a big city. Hazel is starting to miss her friends and her school. Will she stay with her mother in hiding or return to her old life? (74 pgs)

Home Invasion; Reading Level: 2.0 - 3.0, Kathy and Jack Brown awaken to two masked strangers in

their bedroom. What do the strangers want? Can the Browns escape to safety? (69 pages)

The Stalker; Reading Level: 4.0, Mike owns a kayak tour business. This weekend, he'll be taking a tour group around the island. Shortly before the trip, Mike receives chilling phone calls from a mysterious caller who continuously warns him to stay home. Who is the stalker? (74 pgs)

Barrio Kings; Reading Level: 2.0, Rosario Gomez gave up gang life after his brother was killed in a street fight. Now all he wants to do is finish school, work hard, and be a good father. When an old friend shows up, Rosario realizes he can't run away from his past. (125 pgs)

The Way it Works; Reading Level: 2.5, Walter Davis is homeless after medical expenses left him destitute. Can his drive to succeed bring him back from despair? (111 pgs)

The Spider Bites; Reading Level: 2.0, After being accused of taking a bribe, detective Rick Montoya sets out to clear his name. In a strange twist of events, Rick realizes someone has been living in his city apartment. Before he can find out who it is, the apartment goes up in flames. Who was killed in the fire? Was the firebombing meant for him? (131 pgs)

Dive; Reading Level 1.0-2.0, While scuba diving Franco spots an old sunken ship. Curious to look inside, he swims to the wreckage. Suddenly, a big black and pink arm grabs his leg and pulls him into a dark hole inside the ship. Can Franco break free? (50 pgs)

Camp; Reading Level 1.0-2.0, After a long day of hiking, Franco and his family head back to camp. All of a sudden, the smell of smoke is strong and the sky is dark. It's hard to breathe. What's happening to the forest? (50 pgs)

River; Reading Level 1.0-2.0, The Silva family is excited to take a boat ride along the Amazon River until they meet the drunken captain. Can the captain lead them to their destination? (50 pgs)

Crash; Reading Level 1.0-2.0, Franco and his family are on a flight to California when a terrible storm hits. Lightning illuminates the dark night sky. The lights go out and the plane begins falling. Can the pilot make a safe crash landing?

Neptune; Reading Level 1.0-2.0, Franco and his family spot a small boat in trouble while on a deep sea fishing trip in Alaska. The captain throws the boat a line and is shocked when three men storm the ship. Where are they taking Franco and his family? (50 pgs)

If you cannot get to the Resource Center, let Bob know and he'll get you what you need!

REQUEST: Can you find a grammar guide that is complete and easy to use?

SOLUTION: The committee found Grammar Wise Book 1 & Book 2. Student will not be able to write in the books due to price, but may write the answers on paper. You name it, it's in there! One book of each may be checked out.

REQUEST: Can you find a good book that builds vocabulary?

SOLUTION: Word Strategies—Two copies of high beginning, and one book low intermediate.

REQUEST: Are there any books that would deal with workplace vocabulary?

SOLUTION: "Key Vocabulary for a Safe Workplace." We have 1 copy plus a Teacher's Edition. This is about a Level 2-3 reading level book.

As stated before, you won't have to search for these titles. They are displayed on a table in the Resource Center until the end of May. Also, there are 6 copies of Student Writings left over from Recognition Day in case your student could not attend, or you/your student want a 2nd copy.

2014 WPS Volunteer Awards

On Thursday morning, April 10, Bob Garfinkel, Maureen Kinnard, Mary Novak, Anne Laurent and Renee Koenig arrived at the KI Center for the 2014 WPS Awards breakfast event. Little did they know that in less than an hour, a room filled with over 700 volunteers and supporters from all over Northeastern Wisconsin would be cheering for them as they stood on stage and accepted the award for the volunteer award in the small group category!

The WPS Volunteer Awards accepted nominations from hundreds of volunteer organizations across Northeast Wisconsin. There are 7 categories, with 1 winner and 1 runner up designated for each category. Categories are: Large Group, Small Group, Youth, Adult, Education, Leadership, and Lifetime Achievement.

The Bellin Health Small Group Award (a core group of less than 10 people) was awarded to the Literacy Partners Health Literacy Committee for their work in Kewaunee County over the last 4 years. This group has made strides in the fight against health illiteracy not only within our organization, but throughout the county as a whole. The HL Committee has held workshops, programs, clinics, and has been a part of the annual Back To School program for the past 4 years. At this program, the committee and their volunteers educate participating families on the importance of dental health, including teeth brushing and dental visits, etc. Each child and adult have received toothbrushes, toothpaste, floss, and other necessities to keep their oral care in check. To date, the HL Committee has impacted over 1625 Kewaunee County residents and put on 11 health literacy related events.
