

I have had the opportunity and privilege of working with Tiffany over the past few years, and she has been amazing! She reached out to see if we would be responsive to a visit from a S4S team to our event!

Yes, that is right—Literacy Partners—in little Kewaunee County, Wisconsin, is getting visited by a national organization. Not only do they do so much right here in the United States, but they also help provide shoes to those in need <u>all over the world!</u>

Tiffany will be joined by a few others, and it will be their goal to create snippit of what a distribution of their shoes is like. They will interview individuals who will sign a media-release waiver, and be taking large zoomed out group shots, as well as children's backs, etc.

It is our hopes that we help these children feel more confident, as well as help the parents feel a little less pressure with day to day life through doing small things we can—like providing a new pair of shoes to their children, a school t-shirt, dental supplies and books to take home.



But I think my fondest memory is the day she called me to wish me Happy Mother's Day and called me mom. My fond memories center on the read aloud my ladies participate in with kindergarten students. The ladies are thrilled to visit the school and the kindergarteners. They enter the classroom confidently and exhibit great social skills in their friendly interactions with students and staff. They enjoy reading to the students. I think the most memorable experiences of tutoring takes place when a student initiates a conversation in English about something they want to share. –Sr. Mary Anne Albert

Tutoring was a great experience. Mostly because I got to pass on to someone else what I learned taking the citizenship test and going through the whole experience. I also made great friendships and given me opportunity to learn about other cultures, music and food. It has opened my mind and heart more to all immigrants and refugees of all religions as we all want the same striving for a better life and future. – Ingrid Weitzel

I have so many great memories of the students who have come here for TOEFL preparation and the TOEFL test. Great group of people with the potential to make a difference in their families and their home country. I have hosted eight from Guatemala over the recent years, in addition to nine from other nations.

When the first student came and we met at the airport - he knew almost no English and I almost no Spanish - we stood at the baggage claim area and I talked and talked and he kept saying "yes", "ah yes", "sure", years later he told me he had no idea what I was saying but kept saying "yes". He thought that is what he was suppose to do. If people would have seen us and how nervous each of us was as we met for the first time - they would have laughed. Both of us were nervous - like - what are we doing - strangers who will be living together and not knowing anything about the other. I think both of us were really scared!

I tell all of the students when I interview them before coming to the USA that they are to participate as full family members. That means, helping with the cooking, cleaning, washing, shopping, yard work, etc. They find it strange and difficult that we do not have servants. They think all Americans have servants - it is a reality shock to them that Americans do all this "house work" - surprise!!! My general overall memory is trying to show them how to cook, wash dishes, etc. It is so funny watching them make a meal - they have no idea how the food is cooked - mother does all that for them. It is a different world for them once the hit the ground at the airport! I have laughed so many times as they try and try to understand how to do the things we take for granted. Many smile in my heart for these experiences. And - I have photos to prove it!

When they leave - a part of my heart goes with them, sometimes very difficult for me. They do become an important part of my life that now moves on to creating a future for themselves and their families' years after I am gone. –John Wagner

The fond memories I have from the client I tutored is watching this man, with diagnosis of Downs Syndrome, shine when he saw a printed word and could pronounce it. During the three years working with him, he was reading at the fourth grade level. I also was teaching him the elements of playing the piano. With the piano, I concentrated on teaching him some of the basic chords. He was able to play several pieces and committed one or two to memory. Unfortunately, the Door County system, stopped providing him with these services over a year ago. We do hope that he retained some of the successes in reading and can use what he learned to read signs and continues to thrive in his excitement for reading. –Tom Mall

Over the last 11 years that I have been working with students, I have been witness to many memorable experiences: completing two GEDs, watching the citizenship swearing in at that fabulous Milwaukee building, seeing my students children graduate from high school, hearing that several TOEFL students passed and can now get their university degree....But even more memorable is getting to know another person, helping them out with their goals in life and simply sharing times together during lessons. One of the funnest times every year is the Recognition Day picnic because I get to see who else is involved in the tutoring/student process. My student Sandra had two sweet little girls. Mary Beth was in first grade. During class while Sandra was taking a unit test, I asked Mary Beth if she wanted to read one of the book she had received from the literacy picnic. She picked one out and read it to her younger sister and me. Then her sister, who was three years old and only spoke Spanish whispered something to Mary Beth. Mary Beth said she wanted to read her book to me. I wondered how this was going to work since she didn't know English or how to read. We sat and waited. Then Mary Beth finally asked her sister if she could read the book and she nodded her head yes. –Sue Colle

I applied for the Coordinator job for a multitude of reasons, and being completely truthful to myself, one of the biggest reasons was because I was a stay at home mom of twin 2 year olds, and I needed something part time and flexible to give me that little bit of "something else" I needed outside of the home. I had no idea what I was getting into.
